Over the last week at Beechwood.....

Foundation Stage visited Christ Church in Woodley. They really enjoyed finding out about the harvest festival and how their donations of food can help others. In math's sessions they learnt about patterns they can see, hear, and create. In phonics they are learning to recognise and write the sounds I, h, r and j and in literacy are drawing and writing initial sounds and cvc words based on the story "We're going to find the monster".

Years 1 and 2 had a lovely time at their Harvest Festival celebration, they worked really hard creating art and poems for the occasion and performed the songs fantastically. In English this week the children have turned into news reporters and are working in groups to report the events of the Great Fire of London, next week we will be turning these reports into newspaper articles.

Year 3 have been beginning to write their own information texts about volcanoes in English. In French they have been learning French greetings and how to ask someone their name. In computing they have been learning about computer networks and how they connect different devices together. Finally, in Geography, they have been learning about the world's famous volcanoes.

Year 4 have started looking at settings in narrative texts. In maths, they have been looking at column subtraction, as well as considering the most efficient method of subtraction in each situation. They have completed their guided reading text, Ice Palace. In history they have looked at Roman towns. The children have continued with learning about the jazz style of music, and greetings in French.

Year 5 In English, they have been looking at information texts about planet Mars. This week, the children are innovating the texts to plan a report on another planet within our solar-system. In maths, they have moved on from addition and subtraction to multiplication, and will be using different resources to support their learning. During PSHE, they have discussed the difficulties that refugees may have when moving to a new country, and considered their own responsibilities towards others, and how they can work together to help each other learn.


Year 6 have been having great fun this week conducting an investigation into how food decays over time. The children have been eager to look at their bags filled with foods and see what has happened to them - they seem particularly interested in how the strawberries have turned mouldy and liquid! They have also been practising long division this week in maths - the children have been trying their best! In English, they have been innovating a chapter from their book 'The Midnight Guardians'. They have had some really exciting plans so can't wait to read the writing at the end of the week!

Robotic Surgeon

A robotic surgeon celebrates its 10,000th procedure by cutting into a special cake. The robot surgical team at Guy's and St Thomas' hospital has celebrated completing 10,000 operations with the Intuitive da Vinci robot. The robot has been helping patients at the London hospital for over two decades. Surgeons control the machine's four thin arms to conduct operations with higher precision and greater flexibility than can be achieved by the human hand. Ben Challacombe, Head of Robotics at the NHS trust said, 'Da Vinci helps surgeons perform operations and it

improves outcomes for patients.' He also previously said, 'The benefits of robotic surgery include increased operative precision, leading to less pain, smaller scars and less time in hospital so patients can recover quicker.' Prokar Dasgupta, consultant urological surgeon at Guy's and St Thomas' said. 'When we started robotic surgery 20 years ago, we didn't really know how big the service was going to grow. From one early robotic system to the largest programme in the UK, we have come such a long way and helped so many of our patients."

Largest Asteroid Sample on Earth

NASA has announced that the OSIRIS-REX has completed its mission to collect and transport to Earth its largest asteroid sample ever, and that the specimen has landed in the Utah desert! OSIRIS-REX spacecraft, which stands for Origins. Spectral Interpretation, Resource Identification, Security-Regolith Explorer, has been on a 7-year mission to explore and sample an ancient asteroid named Benny, Scientists believe that this near-Earth asteroid sample could help them understand how planets formed, life began, and improve our knowledge of asteroids that could come into contact with our planet. An asteroid is a small rocky body that orbits the Sun. After travelling for over two billion kilometres, OSIRIS-REx landed on Bennu for a few seconds and used a robotic arm to collect a sample of dust and rocks. The sample was then transported to Earth in a capsule that was released from the spacecraft. It glowed red hot as temperatures inside increased to 2,800°C, when it hit the upper atmosphere. The sample landed safely in the desert, using parachutes deployed at the very end of its journey. Scientists then retrieved the capsule and took it to a clean lab for analysis. The event was described on

NASA Astromaterials X page as, 'A scientific treasure box'. They also stated that 'Scientists gasped as the lid was lifted from the OSIRIS-REx asteroid sample return canister, showing dark powder and sand-sized particles on the inside of the lid and base."








Missing Poster Prompts Return of Lost Lego Man


